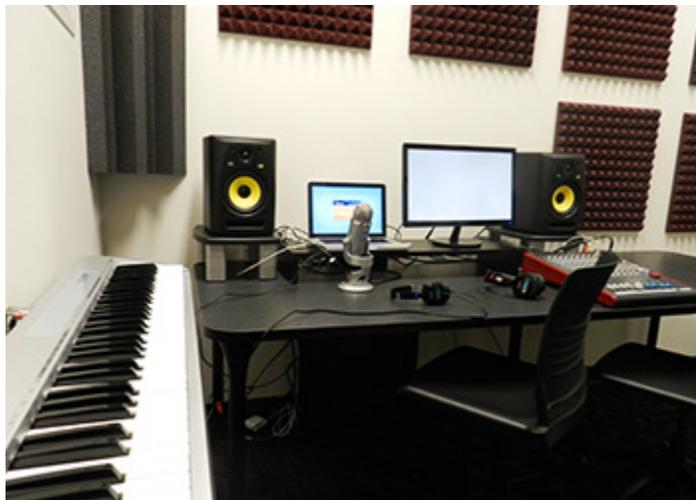
## Call for SLRLN History

## Creative Experience Center Tour, November 5, 2014

Roughly 25 librarians from the area took a tour of the Creative Experience, a digital maker space, at the St. Louis Public Library on November 5 as well as a tour of the historic building. The digital maker space included ideal hardware and software for patrons to create and publish digital media including audio, video, photo, print, and interactive content. The space is for those who are learning new digital media techniques, honing their skills, and even expert-level users. Patrons can learn on their own by watching video tutorials on

## Message from the President

The St. Louis Regional Library Network is in some ways a very different organization than it was just a few years ago. For many years we were known largely for the INFO-PASS program that facilitated cross-library borrowing for many patrons. For the past fifteen years we've also sponsored the annual Tech Expo each winter. But regional and inter-library cooperation have only increased during the past generation, and technology has become so ubiquitous that a librarian typically has multiple resources for learning about what's new. In such a changing environment, what is the appropriate function and purpose of SLRLN? This is the question that has guided the Network Council over the past three years or so, and the answers have resulted in numerous changes in what we do and how we do it.

Today SLRLN exists to provide opportunities and forums for libraries and librarians in our region to share resources and knowledge. These opportunities and forums fall into four categories:

1. The [Shared Calendar](#). SLRLN's web site hosts a Google calendar that shows events and meetings for various professional library groups in our area, including the St. Louis chapter of SLA, the Greater St. Louis Library Club, and others. This is a great way for you to see what other librarians are up to, and to discover events that would help or interest you outside your normal circles. 2. Seasonal Forums. We have expanded from the winter Tech Expo to now sponsoring one event every season. The Tech Expo continues (in fact the call for presenter proposals just went out), but in addition we have held a Spring Speakers Series the past few years in conjunction with our annual members' meeting, and we sponsor professional workshops in the summer (easier for school librarians to attend) and autumn. Some events we arrange and host ourselves; others we co-sponsor with area libraries or professional organizations. It's a full slate that keeps us busy planning year-round, but these are chances for librarians to learn, share, and grow – all the things SLRLN exists to promote.
3. Co-op Purchasing Program. We have negotiated discounted rates for our member libraries with several vendors. This program has been in place for some time, but may not be as widely known as it could be. 4. INFO-PASS. Yes, the Info-Pass program remains in place. SLRLN polled member libraries about this program last year and it received a resounding endorsement. School libraries in particular benefit from the program, but libraries of all types participate. More information on the [Info-Pass](#) is also available on the SLRLN web site.

SLRLN has evolved from a regional remnant of Missouri's former state library system, to a venue for cooperative buying and inter-library lending, to today's facilitator of regional library activity, cooperation, and communication. We want to be a hub through which librarians, libraries, and St. Louis library organizations can come together and benefit from one another's endeavors and expertise. We hope you can join us in making it happen.
